Preparing Your Home for a Ragdoll Kitten

Kitten Proof Your Living Areas

Hydration Tips

Encourage drinking by placing fresh water in multiple locations and using a fountain. Ragdolls may also enjoy a small dish of milk, but use a lactose free formula to avoid digestive issues.

Health and Veterinary Care

Initial Vet Visit

Within the first week, schedule a comprehensive exam. Discuss vaccination schedules, parasite prevention, and a plan for heart screenings (echocardiogram or ECG).

Vaccination Schedule

Typical shots include:

- Feline panleukopenia

- Calicivirus
- Rabies (often combined with distemper)
- Feline leukemia virus (FLU) if your kitten will be exposed to other cats

Parasite Prevention

Administer a monthly dewormer and flea control. Ragdolls are especially sensitive to fleas, which can trigger allergies.

Dental Care

Begin brushing your kitten's teeth at a young age. Use a child safe toothpaste and a soft bristle brush. This helps prevent periodontal disease later in life.
