Answer: B. Monitor the patient's vital signs and look for signs of transfusion reaction

Rationale:Early detection of transfusion reactions is critical. While warming and documentation are important, they are secondary to monitoring for adverse events.

Question:During a health assessment of a 25 year old patient, the nurse notes a systolic blood pressure of 90 mmHg and a diastolic blood pressure of 60 mmHg. Which of the following is the best nursing diagnosis for this patient?

- A. Risk for fluid volume deficit
- B. Risk for ineffective peripheral tissue perfusion
- C. Risk for impaired skin integrity
- D. Risk for impaired gas exchange

Answer: B. Risk for ineffective peripheral tissue perfusion

Rationale:The low blood pressure suggests inadequate perfusion to peripheral tissues. Fluid deficit may also be present but is less specific than perfusion risk in this context.

Question:Which of the following is an appropriate nursing intervention for a patient with a diagnosis of “Risk for infection”?

- A. Encourage the patient to wash hands with soap and water before meals
- B. Administer prophylactic antibiotics as prescribed
- C. Place the patient on strict bed rest
- D. Restrict the patient's diet to a low protein regimen

Answer: A. Encourage the patient to wash hands with soap and water before meals

Rationale:Hand hygiene is the most effective measure to prevent infection. Antibiotic prophylaxis and dietary restrictions are not first line interventions for this risk.
