1. **General Science (GS):** Tests your knowledge of biology, chemistry, physics, and earth science.
2. **Arithmetic Reasoning (AR):** Focuses on solving word problems involving fractions, ratios, and percentages.
3. **Word Knowledge (WK):** Measures vocabulary and the ability to understand word meanings.
4. **Paragraph Comprehension (PC):** Evaluates reading comprehension and critical thinking.
5. **Mathematics Knowledge (MK):** Covers algebra, geometry, and basic math concepts.
6. **Auto and Shop Information (AS):** Assesses knowledge of automotive systems and shop tools.
7. **Mechanical Comprehension (MC):** Tests understanding of mechanical systems and principles.
8. **Electronics Information (EI):** Measures knowledge of electrical circuits and electronics.
9. **General Science (GS) – optional:** Provides additional science questions.
10. **Assembling Objects (AO):** Tests spatial awareness and ability to visualize 3 D objects.

Each subtest is scored on a scale of 0–99, and the combined scores form your Armed Forces Qualification Test (AFQT) score, which determines overall eligibility. For Coast Guard applicants, the AFQT must typically be at least 51, but higher scores unlock more desirable positions.

- Friday – 2 hours: Mixed practice & review
- Saturday – 1 hour: Practice test & analysis
- Sunday – Rest or light review (optional)
