4. Maintain even tension to avoid puckering.
1. Switch to a contrasting thread color (e.g., gold or silver).

2. Outline the floral motif with a light pencil to guide the stitches.
 3. Insert the needle at the base of each petal and stitch upwards, following the outline.
 4. For depth, layer the petals by adding a second satin stitch slightly offset from the first.
 5. Finish the motif by tying a small knot at the base and trimming excess thread.
