Legislation and Regulations Under the HSE's Oversight

Health and Safety at Work Act 1974

At the heart of UK health and safety law is the Health and Safety at Work Act (HSWA). The Act places a duty of care on employers to ensure, as far as reasonably practicable, the health, safety, and welfare of employees and others who may be affected by workplace activities.

Management of Health and Safety at Work Regulations 1999

Control of Substances Hazardous to Health (COSHH) Regulations 2002

Reporting of Injuries, Diseases and Dangerous Occurrences Regulations (RIDDOR) 2013

RIDDOR requires employers to report certain workplace incidents to the HSE within specified timeframes. These reports help the HSE track injury trends and enforce compliance.

Construction (Design and Management) Regulations 2015

Designed to improve safety in the construction sector, these regulations introduce a duty of care for all parties involved in construction projects, from designers to contractors.

Compliance Checklist for Employers

1. Identify All Hazards – Conduct a comprehensive risk assessment covering physical, chemical, biological, ergonomic, and psychosocial hazards.
2. Implement Control Measures – Apply the hierarchy of controls: elimination, substitution, engineering controls, administrative controls, and PPE.
3. Develop Safety Policies – Draft clear, written policies on topics such as fire safety, emergency evacuation, and incident reporting.
4. Appoint Safety Personnel – Designate health and safety officers, risk assessors, and safety representatives as required.
5. Provide Training – Ensure all employees receive relevant safety training, with records maintained for audit purposes.
6. Maintain Documentation – Keep detailed records of risk assessments, incident reports, training logs, and maintenance schedules.
7. Review and Update – Conduct annual reviews of safety policies and risk assessments, incorporating new legislation or operational changes.
8. Engage Employees – Encourage safety participation through committees, suggestion schemes, and open communication channels.
9. Prepare for Inspections – Conduct mock inspections, verify documentation, and address any identified gaps before an HSE visit.
10. Respond to HSE Notices – If receiving an improvement notice or prohibition order, develop a corrective action plan and report progress to the HSE.

Common Workplace Hazards & HSE Guidance

Manual Handling

HSE recommends using mechanical aids, proper lifting techniques, and team lifting for heavy loads. Employers should provide training and conduct regular risk assessments to minimise back injuries.

Slips, Trips, and Falls

Maintain clear walkways, use non slip flooring, and promptly clean up spills. The HSE's "Preventing Falls" guide offers detailed prevention strategies.

Fire Hazards

Inspection Types

- Routine Inspections – Regular visits to assess ongoing compliance.
