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## How to Get Shellac Nail Polish Off: A Complete Guide

Leave the wrapped nails for about 10–15 minutes. For thicker shellac layers, you may need to extend this time to 20 minutes. Check one nail after 10 minutes: if the shellac is still firm, give it a few more minutes.

### **Step 6: Gently Push Off the Shellac**

Using a cuticle pusher or an orange stick, gently press the softened shellac away from the nail. If you're using a buffer, lightly buff the surface to remove any residue. Avoid aggressive scraping, which can damage the nail bed.

### **Step 7: Repeat If Necessary**

Some nails may require a second round of soaking, especially if the first attempt didn't fully dissolve the shellac. Repeat steps 3–6 until the polish is completely removed.

## Step 8: Finish With a Buffer

After the shellac is gone, use a fine nail buffer to smooth the nail surface. This step removes any lingering tackiness and prepares the nail for a fresh coat of regular polish.

## Step 9: Moisturize

Apply cuticle oil or hand lotion to nourish the nail bed and cuticles. This helps restore moisture that acetone may have stripped away.

## Tips & Tricks for a Successful Removal

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### Use the Right Acetone

Pure acetone is more effective than “nail polish remover” that contains a lower concentration of acetone. Look for a product with at least 90% acetone if you’re aiming for a quick and thorough removal.

### Don’t Over Soak

Leaving the acetone on for too long can dry out nails and cuticles, leading to brittleness. Stick to the recommended time frame and check your nails regularly.

### Buffer Lightly

Heavy buffing can thin the nail plate. Use a gentle, light touch and a fine grit buffer. A single pass is usually enough.

### Hydrate Between Sessions

If you’re removing shellac from multiple nails at once, consider alternating between a quick soak and a moisturizing break. This helps keep the nail bed healthy.

### Test a Small Area First

If you’re trying a new removal method (like vinegar or olive oil), test it on one nail first to ensure it won’t cause irritation.

## Household Alternatives: When Acetone Isn’t an Option

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Some people prefer to avoid acetone due to its strong odor or drying effect. Below are safe, at-home options that still yield good results.

### Olive Oil Method

1. Warm a small amount of olive oil until it’s slightly liquid.
2. Apply a generous layer over the shellac and let it sit for 5–10 minutes.
3. Use a cuticle pusher to gently lift the softened shellac.
4. Wipe away any residue with a damp cloth.
5. Finish with a light buffer and moisturize.

### Honey & Warm Water

1. Mix equal parts honey and warm water.
2. Soak a cotton ball in the mixture and place it over each nail.
3. Wrap with foil and wait 10–15 minutes.
4. Gently push off the shellac and buff lightly.

### Baby Oil or Coconut Oil

These oils are excellent for softening shellac and are gentler on the skin. Follow a similar procedure: apply oil, wrap

with foil, wait, and then gently remove.
