1. Dilute one cup of vinegar in a bucket of warm water.
2. Submerge the garment and let it soak for 30–60 minutes.
3. Agitate the fabric gently to help lift the stain.
4. Rinse, then wash as usual.

Note: Vinegar should be used cautiously on delicate fabrics like silk, as it can cause discoloration.

Method 4: Commercial Stain Removers
