7. MoisturizeApply cuticle oil or hand cream to rehydrate the nails and skin. Consider a nail strengthener to restore moisture and flexibility.

When done correctly, the foil wrap method removes Shellac cleanly, leaving a smooth nail surface ready for a fresh coat of polish or a natural look.

Method 2: The Quick Soak Technique

For those who prefer a faster, less time consuming approach, the quick soak method can be effective—especially if you're removing only a few nails or if your Shellac is not heavily layered.

1. Prepare a Soaking BowlFill a shallow bowl with 100% acetone. Ensure the bowl is large enough for your fingers to sit comfortably without splashing.
2. Submerge the NailsPlace your fingertips in the acetone, keeping them submerged for 5–10 minutes.

2. Apply the RemoverSoak a cotton pad in the remover and place it over each nail.
