Paul addresses the misuse and confusion surrounding spiritual gifts, especially speaking in tongues and prophecy. He emphasizes that the purpose of gifts is to build up the church (1:12). The famous "love chapter" (13) serves as a litmus test for genuine spiritual gifts: love must precede all other gifts.

In the final chapters, Paul defends the doctrine of the resurrection, arguing that it is essential for Christian faith. He explains that believers are "living together in the hope of the resurrection" (15:12) and that the resurrection is the ultimate vindication of Christ's victory over death.

Paul's instructions on sexual morality, marriage, and the treatment of widows and slaves demonstrate his concern for the ethical conduct of believers. He calls for a lifestyle that reflects the holiness of the new covenant, urging the Corinthians to "live in a manner worthy of the gospel" (3:1).

- 1 Corinthians 13:4–7 – "Love is patient, love is kind..." This passage has become a staple in Christian liturgy, weddings, and theological education.
