### Fractions and Decimals

1. Add:  $\frac{2}{5} + \frac{3}{10}$ .
2. Subtract:  $0.75 - 0.23$ .
3. Multiply:  $\frac{4}{9} \times \frac{3}{4}$ .
4. Convert 0.625 to a fraction.

### Ratios and Proportions

1. If the ratio of cats to dogs in a shelter is 3:4, how many dogs are there if there are 9 cats?
2. In a recipe, 2 cups of flour are used for 4 servings. How many cups are needed for 10 servings?

### Geometry Problems

1. Find the perimeter of a rectangle with length 8 cm and width 5 cm.
2. Calculate the area of a square with side 7 cm.
3. Determine the volume of a rectangular prism measuring 3 cm  $\times$  4 cm  $\times$  5 cm.

### Data and Probability

1. Interpret a bar graph showing the number of books read by students.
2. If you flip a fair coin twice, what is the probability of getting at least one head?
3. Construct a line graph from the following data set: Monday – 12, Tuesday – 18, Wednesday – 9.

## Strategies for Mastering Fifth Grade Math Questions

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### Build a Strong Number Sense

Understanding the relationships between numbers is crucial. Practice mental math, use base ten blocks, and work with number lines to visualize operations.

### Use Visual Models
