- Can you share recent employment statistics for graduates?

### **Financial Aid & Scholarships**

Financial transparency can prevent surprises later on.

- What types of scholarships are available for incoming students?
- How does the school handle cost sharing for international students?
- Are there work study programs that align with my major?
- What is the typical debt load for graduates of this program?
