5. Move the needle forward to the next point and repeat steps 3–4.
6. Finish with a small knot on the backside.

3.3 The Satin Stitch

The satin stitch fills a shape with a smooth, satin like finish.

1. Thread the needle and position it at the starting point of the shape.

2. Insert the needle forward into the fabric.
3. Pull the thread until a small loop forms.
4. Insert the needle back through the loop, pulling it tight.
5. Move the needle slightly forward and repeat steps 3–4, overlapping each stitch by about half a stitch length.
6. Continue until the shape is filled, then secure with a knot.

3.4 The French Knot

French knots create small, raised dots perfect for highlights or decorative accents.

1. Hold a small amount of thread in your fingers.
2. Insert the needle through the fabric where you want the knot.
3. Pull the thread until it's taut, then twist the thread around the needle a few times.
4. Pull the needle back through the twist, creating a tight loop.
5. Trim any excess thread and secure the knot with a small tuck.

3.5 The Chain Stitch

The chain stitch is a decorative stitch that resembles a chain of loops.

1. Thread your needle and insert it forward into the fabric.
2. Pull the thread until a small loop forms on the surface.
