2. Join with a slip stitch to form a ring.
3. Work 3 double treble stitches into the ring.
4. Make a chain of 2 stitches (this creates the corner).
5. Repeat the 3 double treble stitches and chain 2 corner sequence until you have 4 corners.
6. Finish the round with a slip stitch, then chain 2 to create the center hole.
7. Continue for as many rounds as desired.

Feel free to swap double treble stitches for single treble, half double treble, or even single crochet if you prefer a denser fabric.

3. Materials You'll Need

3.1 Yarn Choices

Granny squares work well with a variety of yarns. Here are some popular options:

- Worsted Weight – Ideal for blankets and scarves; offers a balanced stitch size.
- Bulky Weight – Perfect for quick projects like afghans; creates a chunky, cozy texture.
- Lightweight or Fingering – Great for delicate items like baby blankets or lace y accessories.
- Cotton or Linen – For a breathable, natural feel, especially in warmer climates.

3.2 Hook Sizes

The hook size depends on your yarn weight and desired stitch tension. A general rule is to use a hook that produces a stitch size of about 4–5 mm. For example:

- Worsted weight yarn – 5–5.5 mm hook.
- Bulky weight yarn – 7–8 mm hook.
- Lightweight yarn – 3–4 mm hook.

3.3 Additional Tools

While a hook and yarn are essential, consider the following tools for a smoother experience:

- Stitch markers to keep track of rounds.
- Yarn needle for weaving in ends.
- Yarn bowl or container to keep yarn from tangling.
- Measuring tape or ruler for sizing.

4. Step by Step Instructions for Beginners

4.1 Preparing Your Yarn

Before you start, wind your yarn onto a ball or a yarn bowl. This helps prevent tangles and ensures a consistent tension throughout the project.

4.2 The Foundation Chain

Count out 4 chain stitches. This number can be increased for a larger square or decreased for a smaller one. Keep the tension even to maintain a uniform shape.

4.3 Joining and First Round

Join the chain with a slip stitch to form a ring. Then, work 3 double treble stitches into the ring. This will be the first corner of your square.

4.4 Creating Corners

After the initial 3 stitches, chain 2 stitches. This chain creates the corner space. Repeat the 3 double treble stitches and chain 2 corner sequence until you have four corners, completing the first round.

4.5 Center Hole

Finish the round by slip stitching back to the beginning, then chain 2 to create the center hole. The hole allows you to join multiple squares together later.

4.6 Continuing Rounds

Repeat the corner pattern for each subsequent round. If you want a denser square, add more stitches per corner before the chain 2. For example, 4 double treble stitches per corner will give a thicker fabric.

4.7 Finishing the Square

When you've reached the desired number of rounds, finish with a slip stitch. Weave in the yarn tail using a yarn needle to secure the end.

5. Advanced Variations and Techniques

5.1 Color Changing Granny Squares

One of the most popular granny square variations is the **color changing granny square**. The technique involves adding a new color at the beginning of each round. The new yarn is carried over the top of the previous color, creating a striped effect.

1. Start with your first color and complete the first round.
2. For the second round, wrap the new yarn around the hook, then work the 3 stitches for the new color.
3. Carry the old yarn over the new yarn for the remaining stitches.
4. Repeat for each round, adding a new color each time.

5.2 Granny Square with a Twist

Adding a twist to the traditional granny square can create a 3 dimensional effect. Here's a simple method:

- After completing each round, pull the yarn slightly to create a twist.
- Continue twisting for each new round to build depth.
- Finish with a slip stitch, then weave in the yarn.

5.3 Granny Square in Different Stitches

While double treble stitches are common, granny squares can be made with a variety of stitches:

- Single Treble – Creates a lighter, more open square.
- Half Double Treble – Offers a middle ground between single and double treble.
- Single Crochet – Produces a dense, sturdy square.
