Practice moving from one chord to the next at a slow tempo, gradually increasing speed as you feel comfortable. Remember, the goal is smoothness—don't sacrifice clarity for speed.

Playing the Song in Different Keys

While the original key is G major, many guitarists transpose the song to suit their vocal range. Using a capo on the 2nd fret allows you to play the same chord shapes while sounding in A major. Alternatively, you can move all chords up two frets for a higher key.
